Education is an important part of L'Arche™. This issue provides windows into the impact of L'Arche on the lives of young people. Today many young people thirst for a vision of society that is just, inclusive and compassionate.

In Brief...

Canadian Curriculum Services, the pan-Canadian evaluating service used by Education Ministries and private schools, recommends L'Arche's *Belonging* curriculum as "challenging, stimulating and relevant," and its format as "superb." It is directed to senior students in Social Sciences, Leadership, and Religious Studies. An estimated 400,000 students have been exposed to this curriculum.

St. Francis Xavier University and L'Arche Canada are collaborating to offer a five-unit distance learning Diploma Program in Assisted Living. The course content is presently being written, with the plan to launch the program in the next year.

The grade eight students in Mrs. Brownlee's class at Crossland Public School in Newmarket, Ontario know how to create a welcoming

classroom environment where each one belongs and has a place. Two years ago, inspired by the L'Arche curriculum package *Belonging: The Search for Acceptance*, Laurie Brownlee re-structured a core two-month segment of her class's school year around this theme. "I spend time introducing the concepts," she explains. "We incorporate fun games that help the students think about what it feels like to belong and not to belong. Each student keeps a journal in which they write a poem and a recipe for Belonging and answer questions from the L'Arche curriculum so as to explore issues of friendship, group behaviour

and their own experiences of inclusion and exclusion. Their journals are creative and remarkably mature. Last year, each student wrote to Jean Vanier about the *Belonging* film. They were thrilled when he wrote back to the class."

love for yourself and life*


Serve as soon as possible. Recipe can serve as many people as it needs to.

L'Arche Calgary Presents L'Arche and *Belonging* Curriculum to Schools

Members of L'Arche Calgary visit schools to talk about L'Arche, living with a disability, and the vision of Jean Vanier. Students view the film *Belonging* as part of the program. This year they introduced over 500 grade 10 students to *Belonging*, and last year over 700 grade 9 students. Through grants from the Persons with Developmental Disabilities Foundation and the Alberta Teachers Association Local 55, they made a gift of L'Arche Canada's *Belonging* curriculum (film and study guide) to 72 schools over two years.
